GOLDING'S USE OF DESCRIPTIVE LANGUAGE AND SYMBOLISM IN CHAPTER 7 ELEVATES THE NARRATIVE FROM A SIMPLE ADVENTURE STORY TO A PROFOUND PSYCHOLOGICAL STUDY. THE VIVID IMAGERY OF SHADOWS AND THE DENSE JUNGLE ATMOSPHERE CREATES A SENSE OF FOREBODING THAT MIRRORS THE CHARACTERS' INTERNAL TURMOIL.

COMPARED TO EARLIER CHAPTERS, CHAPTER 7 INTENSIFIES THE NOVEL'S TONE, MOVING FROM CURIOSITY AND HOPE TOWARD FEAR AND DESPAIR.
