Using Finder on macOS Catalina and Later

With the removal of iTunes in macOS Catalina and later, managing files happens through Finder.

1. Open the Music app and trim your song to 30 seconds or less using the method described above.
2. Export the clip as an AAC file.
3. Find the exported file in Finder, then rename its extension from .m4a to .m4r.

4. Connect your iPhone via USB and open Finder.
5. Select your iPhone from the sidebar, then click the *Tones* tab.
6. Drag and drop the .m4r file into the Tones section.
7. Sync your iPhone to transfer the ringtone.

Using GarageBand on iPhone to Create Ringtones
